Dear Representative:

As you consider Fiscal Year 2012 (FY 2012) funding levels for the U.S. Department of Education, we urge you to reject the massive cuts to Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs), Predominantly Black Institutions (PBIs), Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSIs), Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs) and other Minority-Serving Institutions (MSIs) as proposed in the funding bill drafted by the House Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations Subcommittee.

In total, the House proposal would eliminate 41 percent of all federal funding for MSIs under Titles III and V of the Higher Education Act. It would reduce discretionary funding by 83 percent for HSIs and 36 percent for HBCUs, and it would totally eliminate such funding for TCUs, PBIs and institutions serving Native Hawaiians, Alaskans and Pacific Islanders. Cuts of this magnitude would devastate the campuses that receive this funding and the students who depend on it.

MSIs represent less than 20 percent of all postsecondary schools but they enroll 35 percent of African Americans, Hispanics and American Indians. They are costeffective and efficient pathways that enable students from all walks of life—especially low-income, first generation students from chronically underserved communities—to enroll in higher education and to graduate, with benefits to themselves, their communities and the nation. MSIs educate disproportionate numbers of traditionally underrepresented minorities in STEM and other growth and high-need disciplines.

Drastic cuts in funding for these schools will unavoidably have a disastrous effect on minority students' college participation and completion at precisely the time the federal government is eager to increase the number and percentage of Americans with degrees. We urge you to maintain FY 2011 funding levels for these programs in any FY 2012 omnibus appropriations bill.
